In her final year of study, doing a diploma in photo imaging Drift is embarking on a creative endeavor, as one of Melbourne's up and coming emerging photographers. She first discovered her mother's camera when she was 12 and began taking pictures around the house of her younger siblings, chasing them frantically, and begging them to pose.

"As a teen I never did well in school, as I was always distracted by my own creative thoughts. I would often run away in my imagination, dreaming up concepts and themes for little shoots. Growing up in a small town as the underdog was never easy, so my imagination was my only true outlet and friend".

When she was 18 she moved to London, where she was surrounded by a sea of diversity and uniqueness, which later lead to a humbled fascination with the human form and face. She earned her living in London for 6 years painting faces, and performing in various clubs.

"London was a great time for me, as it opened me up creatively and was a great platform of self expression. It was a place where I felt very free and where I truly started to find my own voice".

After 6 years of living abroad it was time for Drift to move back to her native Melbourne, where she continued to explore and express her creativity.

"I've always dabbled in various things over the years, but looking back, one of the only things I've ever truly loved doing is creating something very beautiful, and then capturing it in camera".



Wow, it has been a crazy few weeks for me. I have been recruiting for a new operations manager for my mortgage broking business. I have received dozens of CVs, culled them back to the best applicants and had interviews with the best candidates.

Interviewing is hard time consuming work but then so is applying for and getting the right job. Below are some of my thoughts on how to prepare for your interview or things to consider when you are in line for the next top job.

A common question interviewers pose to prospective job candidates is "Aren't you overqualified?". This demonstrates a concern about your commitment to the position.

Make sure that you ask probing questions about the company, sound interested and, most importantly, express long term aspirations you have directly related to the job position and the business/company.

If the interviewer suspects you're keen to take the next better thing that comes along they may be reluctant to employ you! There's no need to lie, however don't tell them you're true aspiration is in some distant field and that's really what makes you happy - they'll rightly assume you'll jump ship at the first port.



Do you know what K.P.I.s are? Lots of people don't...so find out! Your knowledge of K.P.I.s (Key Performance Indicators) will demonstrate that you can measure, target and realise targets set by you, your team or business/company.

Do some homework prior to the interview and memorise some important K.P.I.s from previous roles. Are you worth the salary? Demonstrate some balls here, but don't be cocky. Boldness wins the day where some interview questions are concerned! Play up you success in previous roles.

Whether you've cut costs or introduced a new administration system, let the interviewer know. If you are prepared to verbally demonstrate your value during the interview why wouldn't they assume you'll earn your salary?




The atmosphere at Bomba is simple, remembering to be honest with the building, the food, the staff and the service.

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q drag: POLLY FILLA

Polly Filla always gives an amazing performance. She is no drag performer who simply lip syncs the latest Ga Ga or Beyoncé. Alan Mayberry caught up with her at the GH to find out more about the creation of her onstage magic.

'I was born in the wagon of a travelling show'... Well, almost! I was born in Wellington, the capital of New Zealand, where I lived for 28 years until moving to Melbourne! I went to school in Wellington, and dropped out in the final year of high school, then worked for a year or so before studying Fashion Design at university. I was actually still going to school and going out in drag at the weekends! The drinking age was 20 in NZ back then, and we figured no one would ever ID two under-age gay boys in drag – and they never did!

From an early age I knew I was different from the other little boys, though I didn't make the connection to sexuality until puberty. I really related to the witches in the *HR PufnStuf* movie – they weren't really evil or scary – just misunderstood because they were different ... and wore fabulous costumes!

I always say that I came out twice – first as a gay man, and secondly as a drag queen. Around puberty I found the boys were all admiring girls, while I was busy admiring the boys. I didn't even know why – I just used think boys were sexier than girls. Then I learned there was a word for people like me: FAGGOT. And faggots were sick and disgusting and wrong. I had some very difficult teenage years and kept myself occupied getting involved in as many theatre productions as possible, in denial about my sexuality.

I'd been doing magic and clowning and street theatre, and I loved old disco songs and sequins and feather boas and playing around with make-up and wigs, and making costumes and play acting, but had always felt constrained by a script. And then one day I saw *The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert!* Suddenly, it was like this massive epiphany. Everything just went click – I saw myself on screen and just knew that that's what I was born to do. It was a total creative outlet through music, performance, comedy, mime, costume design, make-up art and impersonation. I can be anyone and anything I want to be when I do drag.

I'd always been drawn to the stage - my first role was playing a currant bun in a baker's



shop, and Father Christmas in our kinder Christmas pageant. At the age of 10 I joined an after-school drama group and my first 'proper' role was playing an Oompa Loompa in the end of year play *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. After that, I had the bug badly and did everything from holiday pantos to Shakespeare to Dylan Thomas's *Under Milkwood*.

My first professional 'paid' performance was actually as a clown at childrens' birthday parties when I was still in high school. I copped a lot of flack at school for being 'a clown' – however, the kids soon shut up when I revealed I was earning \$50 per show, while they were on the minimum wage stacking shelves at the supermarket. Fast forward 17 years and I'm still wearing silly costumes, wigs and giant shoes and running around on stage making people laugh!

My first actual drag performance was at a fund-raising dance party – a friend and I performed two numbers: *Waterloo* by ABBA, followed by a new song by a little-known girl group: *Wannabe* by the Spice Girls!

In my mind there are many highlights of my drag career – hosting Wellington City's New Years Eve Countdown in Civic Square (the equivalent of Fed. Square) for 3 years, winning the Wellington Cup Avant Garde Section Fashion Award 4 years running (like the Melbourne Cup), costuming a 13-part TV series, touring my solo theatre show *Kitsch in Synch* and winning the 'Best Costumier' ALSO award.

One real stand out was performing to a 3000+ capacity crowd, everyone from tiny tots to grandparents, in the Botanical Gardens Soundshell at my public farewell performance in Wellington. I received a standing ovation and was completely moved to tears. Annually for four years, the Wellington City Council completely believed in me that I would produce a 90 minute-long, G-rated, energetic dragstravaganza that they asked me back each year for 4 years – and people would bring their kids, parents and grandparents.



period pieces. I think this is what makes my style of drag unique.

I recently made the change from being a financially struggling freelance costume maker to a customer service role in a call centre. Not as creative a position, however it's still a challenging role – and its a bit more peace of mind knowing you'll be able to pay the rent each week!

I'm still creating costumes and producing and performing most weekends on top of my day job.

My drag persona's age is definitely older than my actual age. Polly Filla is this kooky post-modern retro character aged somewhere between 40 and death; part Auntie Mame, Part Witchiepoo, living in a Barbie dream house in Stepford with Ann Miller's wardrobe. (I completely adore those older musicals with fabulous Gowns by Jean Louis, Bob Mackie and Orry Kelly) TV variety specials from the 60s and 70s that you can watch on you tube (*Comedic Tragedy, Valley of the Dolls*, Miss Hannigan from *Annie*).

The older lady lusting after her spunky dancing boys, completely oblivious to the fact that they're gay.

I've always been inspired by those larger-than-life comedic actresses Carol Burnett and Lily Tomlin. I completely adore Bette Midler – mainly her live material pre Beaches era.

But my drag persona has predominantly been Rosalind Russell's portrayal of two fantastic stage ladies – Mama Rose from *Gypsy*, and Mame Dennis from *Auntie Mame* – frenetic, crazy and totally fabulous!

I love lipsynching spoken word dialogue and obscure numbers – I've never really been interested in lipsynching to the latest pop song, I prefer character and story-telling-driven performances and

To relax I adore going somewhere for dinner with friends, followed by a visit to the theatre, ballet or movies.

You can catch me regularly at SIRCUIT every Sunday, The 86 on the first Saturday of the month every other month, and at The GH, DT's Hotel and other venues around town doing guest spots.

What do I hope to be doing in 5 years you ask? I'll be celebrating my 40th birthday somewhere fabulous surrounded by all my friends – wondering where the years went!

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

RUBYICE SET TO IGNITE J-POP IN AUSTRALIA

J-Pop is a musical genre that is yet to be established in Australia but identical twin sisters Courtney and Brittany Menegon – aka Rubylce – are already at the pointy end of the popular Asian Pop underground movement in the country and proved this when their new single "Can't Nobody" dropped on September 6.

With rich energy and vivacious personalities, the 18 year-old duo have already made an impressive debut earlier this year with their apty-titled single "Energetic" which has already established them as the "Aussie Jpop duo who are about to take Japan by storm" as proclaimed by Joy FM's Asia Pop Radio Australia (APRA) show.

Their follow up single "Can't Nobody" - out now - was written by legendary K-Pop producer Teddy Park who masterminded tracks by high profile chart topping Korean artists including 2NE1 and BigBang.

"Recording 'Can't Nobody' was the absolute experience of a lifetime for us," says the pair. "This song is about not giving up, and not allowing people's false ideas to destroy your dreams. It's all about standing tall, holding your head high and living your dream".

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














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q travel: with BARRIE MAHONEY

Barrie Mahoney was a head teacher and school inspector in the UK, as well as a reporter in Spain, before moving to the Canary Islands to launch and edit a new English language newspaper. He is still enjoying life in the sun as a columnist and author, and continues to write a series of popular novels, books for expats, as well as designing mobile apps and websites to promote the Canary Islands.



The Silly Season and the Savage Islands

For expats living in Spain, the current diplomatic spats between Spain and the UK about Gibraltar are uncomfortable, and potentially worrying. The previously very good relations between Madrid and London have been overshadowed by an often-heated dispute over territory that has lingered for many years. Many observers claim that the current territorial arguments are due to political and economic tensions in both countries, political and financial scandals in Spain, all embraced in the heady mix of the August 'Silly Season'. Whatever the reasons, frosty relations between countries are always unwelcome news for expats.

Recent news reports of another, and similar dispute, this time between Spain and Portugal, relating to Portugal's Savage Islands, are both interesting and relevant at this particular time. Although vaguely aware of the Savage Islands, I was not aware of any international hostilities until recently. Little public and media attention has been given to this issue, which has troubling international dimensions.

It appears that Spain has quietly lodged an appeal with the United Nations to have the islands, which are Portugal's southernmost territory, reclassified as rocks and not islands. This is not merely a question of semantics, because the main purpose is to reduce Portugal's exclusive economic zone, which is currently the largest in Europe, and a move that would allow Spanish fishing vessels based in the Canary Islands to fish closer to the Portugaes island of Madeira.

The Savage Islands are located between Spain's Canary Islands and Portugal's Madeira, which allows Portugal's territorial waters to reach within 40 nautical miles of the Spanish territory. In terms of distance, the Savage Islands are closer to the Canary Islands than Madeira. The Savage Islands have been a Portuguese territory since 1438, unlike the Canary Islands that were colonised by the Spanish. Humans had never been known to set foot in the Savage Islands before the Portuguese discovered it. Interestingly, the islands also have a reputation as the treasure islands of pirates, and there are many stories of hunting for treasure. According to a number of documents, serious digs have been attempted in recent years to recover the hidden treasure, but nothing was found.

In more recent times, in 1938, the Permanent Commission of International Maritime Law gave sovereignty of the Savage Islands to Portugal and in 1959, the World Wildlife Fund became interested in the islands and signed a contract with the owner, Luís Rocha Machado. However, in 1971 the Portuguese government intervened and acquired the islands, converting them into a nature reserve.

In 1978, the Savage Islands became part of the Madeira Nature Park, which is one of the oldest nature reserves in Portugal, and in 2002, part of the nature reserve was nominated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. A small team of wardens currently inhabits the islands. Over the years, the Portuguese navy has seized a number of Spanish fishing vessels for breaching their territorial waters.

In Spain and the Canary Islands, fishermen firmly believe that these islands should be reclassified as rocks. Although the Spanish Government publicly states that they do not have an issue over the sovereignty of the Savage Islands, their reclassification would effectively remove 700 years of Portugal's sovereign rights to the islands.


Portugal is currently responding to Spain's actions with its own submission to the United Nations that contests Spanish claims. In order to underline the point regarding sovereignty, the President of Portugal, Cavaco Silva, recently paid a surprise visit to the islands where he was the first Portuguese head of state to spend a night on the islands, admittedly in the relative comfort of a frigate parked nearby.

The United Nations is expected to issue a verdict on the Savage Islands in 2015. It will be interesting to see if the UN supports the claims of an unpopular Spanish Government towards the Savage Islands, which some claim are similar to the diversionary tactics of the Gibraltar issue.
