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

JETPETS LEADS THE WAY IN ACHIEVING CEIV CERTIFICATION FOR THE SAFE TRANSPORTATION OF LIVE ANIMALS



It is no doubt that pets are well and truly a part of the family in Australian households. And when it comes to relocating homes interstate or overseas, pets make the move with their families too.

Pet travel company Jetpets has transported over 50,000 pets to date in 2019 - 69% made up of dogs, 15% cats, and 14% made up of other animals such as birds, rabbits and reptiles.

One of the top concerns for fur-parents when transporting their pets is their safety when travelling by air, however Jetpets is able to minimise all concerns as their Melbourne headquarters has become the first pet transport company in the Asia Pacific Region to be awarded The Centre of Excellence for Live Animals Logistics (CEIV) Certification.

Ceviche with fennel - «cook» with acid

Fresh and light, we welcome the coming year. Ceviche is considered one of Peru's national dishes and is the preparation of raw fish with lime. The acid of the lime denatures the protein of the fish and thus "cooks" it. There are many recipes, following my variation.

Preparation I Cut away the bottoms and stems from the fennel tubers. Pluck the fennel green and set it aside. Use a kitchen slicer to slice the fennel finely. Then sprinkle a little salt over the slices, toss well, and set aside for 30 minutes.

Cut the fish fillets into 5 mm slices with a sharp knife and place them in a flat porcelain or glass dish - do not use a metal one! Then pour the juice of the four limes over the fish, cover, and put

the dish in the fridge to marinate. After 10 minutes, turn the fish slices and place them in the cold for another 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, cut away the peel of the Pink Grapefruits with a knife and cut out the segments without the membranes.

Mix the carrot juice with the tarragon mustard (can be bought in gournet shops) and the oil to a sauce, season with a little salt and pepper. The sauce is slightly sweet and will balance the citrusy fish.

Take the fish out of the fridge. The pieces of fish are «cooked» now by the acid of the limes and should be snow-white.

Serving I Spoon the sauce on flat plates, place the fennel on top. Continue to drain the fish slices and place them together with the pink grapefruit slices on

top. Finally, decorate with the fennel green.

Ingredients

400 g of fish e.g., Cod 4 limes 2 medium-size Fennel with fennel green 2 pink grapefruit 200 ml carrot juice 4 Tbsp neutral cooking oil 3 tsp tarragon mustard (or sweet mustard) Salt and pepper for seasoning.

Preparation time: 40 minutes Serves 4

q love: Aunt Lydia & her Niece – Creating Extra-ordinary Families

After The Handmaid's Tale, it might be difficult to welcome into your family a US surrogate called Aunt Lydia, but that's just what Rees Rear and Brett Ramsay did back in 2007.

The guys are New Zealanders by birth. Rees is from a small country town, is half Maori with three siblings and a wide family network. When Rees was a teenager his mother reminded him -I want grandchildren. Rees had no idea how to make that happen. Brett was adopted. Even when they fell in love in 1991 -28 years ago - they discussed the importance of children.

Rees & Brett are not your stereotypical gay couple. Despite living in Sydney for nearly three decades, they've never been to the Mardi Gras party.

It wasn't until both were in their late thirties that they took the leap – choosing to engage in US surrogacy. By then they had made good money from their real estate business and a well-timed property sale meant they could afford the security of a US process. It was 2007 and there were few couples even discussing surrogacy back then. Rees remembers finding a reputable Californian IVF clinic online.

Yet the most important issue for these guvs was their choice of donor. After examining profiles of hundreds of US donors online. Rees remained uncomfortable. Many wanted anonymity or had no interest in maintaining any contact post birth. But for Rees and Brett. their ideal was far from the dystopic Handmaids Tale. They wanted their children to have an extended family- not just their surrogate



but the woman they shared a biological connection with. When it came to the donor profiles they were offered online, "You don't know the soul of the person" Rees explains.

So when, in a conversation with their US surrogate, she said "My niece Noralynn will do this for you", Rees felt it was perfect. Their son was born in 2008. Rather than an awkward hyphenated surname, they combined elements and Ramrear went on the ID documents for baby Chandler. A year later, Aunt Lydia called them to say she had been asked to carry again for a couple in Spain. "But if you want to go again, I'd love to be the one".

Rees and Brett were thrilled. The offer lead to a double embryo transfer and twins Blake and Joel born in 2010. The problem was they were eight weeks early, a common scenario with twin pregnancies which remain high risk. "It was really stressful" Rees admits, with the boys in Intensive Care for a long time and large medical bills.

All three boys have always known Noralynn as 'mum'. They have US and Australian citizenship, though when Rees applied for New Zealand citizenship, it was denied. Rees was outraged and it led to an appearance on New Zealand's TV3.

This family has always taken risks – they shared the chaos of two dads, three young boys and three dogs on Grand Designs Australia back in 2012, when their journey to create their dream Annandale home was featured. Just last year they rented their home out and took the three boys, now aged nine and eleven on an extra-ordinary two month Eurail adventure through 17 countries and 35 cities. "Our children fit into our lives, we don't fit into theirs' Rees laughs.

Gay singles and couples will share their extraordinary journeys to parenthood via egg donation or surrogacy at Growing Families February conferences in Sydney, Melbourne and Auckland. 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q music: **GENESIS**

The Australian electronic pop band, Parralox, fronted by out singer John von Ahlen, continues its mission to champion the synthesized wave pop sound of Depeche Mode, The Human League, Erasure, New Order, Pet Shop Boys and the spirit of Madonna in her 80s day-glo era with its ninth studio album, Genesis, out now. "Everything we do is informed from a blend of 80's music and current dance beats, specifically progressive house," explains von Ahlen. The album's forthcoming single release is "Tears of Faith," a down-tempo electronic dance arrangement featuring vocals by Jane Badler. The song is about broken relationships, the hope for reconciliation and the need for humanity to be kinder to one other, as well as to ourselves. Produced by John von Ahlen, Parralox's new album, Genesis and its first single, "Tears of Faith feat. Jane Badler", are available on Apple Music, Amazon, Spotify, and all digital platforms now.

"Pop music can be quite vacuous and so it's always a challenge to write songs that have meaning and substance," continues von Ahlen from his Australian home. "It isn't about changing the world, although sometimes it can be. Pop's about spreading something positive, inspiring people, taking them on a journey and elevating them somehow."

Genesis follows the band's previous album, Subculture. According to von Ahlen, the album represents growth for the band. "Genesis is more mature than anything we've ever produced, especially in terms of its songwriting," he contends. "When the band first started, we borrowed a lot from the 80s. We still do today, but to a much lesser extent. We're finding more of our own style and exhibiting our own unique perspective."

The band has experienced several shakeups through its history - several singers have come and gone - but the lineup has been pretty stable for the last six years. It currently features female vocalists Johanna Gervin and Louise Love and Bass Guitarist lan Burden (formerly of The Human League). John von Ahlen is the band's lead vocalist; something that still surprises him.

"I never wanted to be a pop singer," he admits. "I still don't! I totally fell into it assbackwards."

For years, John von Ahlen was simply a



music producer, specializing in production and engineering for other artists. He was making excellent money, but it got to a point where he felt trapped in a soulless job. Anxious to make music for himself, he launched The Tenth Stage, a very dark, gothic and theatrical band with an electronic element. It wasn't enough. He had pop music inside of him, and it needed to be heard.

In 2007, he collaborated with vocalist Rowena "Roxy" Martin on a new track he had written, "I Fell in Love with a Drum Machine". The song was a hit and led to the duo recording their first album together, Electricity. It included the single, "Sharper Than a Knife", heralded by Hollywood gossip columnist Perez Hilton.

What started as a joke on a dare, was transformed into something very serious. "I work seven days a week on Parralox," von Ahlen reveals. "When we're not in the studio, I'm working on the website - a massive job - and social media, which can be so tedious but it has to be done."

Like anything important in life, there are no shortcuts. Maintaining a band like Parralox is grueling work and requires maximum faith in yourself and the people you work with. "Don't get me wrong, the band has made its share of mistakes, but we keep pushing on," von Ahlen says. "All the time, I hear from musicians, 'you gotta be committed, you can never give up' and so many other cliché phrases like it. I almost want to rip my eyeballs out, but you know what? It really is true."

q regional: LGBTIQI+ IN SMALLER COMMUNITIES

My name is Dakota Rae,

I am an Australian adult film actor and model for Cheeky Boys Australia. My life wasn't always as great as it is now, this is the story of my hometown.

Growing up in a small rural town in outback NSW called Lightning Ridge I noticed that LGBTQI+ was something that wasn't accepted in the town by many people.

I'd always hear the words gay, faggot, poof and queer used in general conversation and that's not just in the youth it was also amongst the adults.

It was homophobic, even at some of the kid's birthday parties I'd go to the games would be homophobic such as "The last one to reach the other side of the park would be gay, and parents would fully support these types of games.

There was one openly gay guy in Lightning Ridge who always liked to colour his hair rainbow and his eyebrows rainbow, he'd paint his nails and wear big leather boots. I really admired his bravery to step out in public with pride and not ever caring about what names the town called him.

The one thing about him that made it hard for me to come out is gay was that he set an image in the eyes of the community that all LGBTQI+ people were like that.

In 2016 when I moved to the Gold Coast QLD, I came out as gay and was fully supported by my friends and family, I did go back to my hometown in Lightning Ridge where people would often approach me and say "You don't look or act gay?

At this stage I felt confidence and I didn't care what anyone thought of me and I explained and showed them



that LGBTQI+ isn't a personality or a dress code but it is the preference of love and feelings.

Some people like cats, others like dogs. Some people like red and others like pink. You wouldn't hate your friends or family for liking a different colour, animal or TV show than you do, would you? It's the same with being LGBTQI+ you might not like it but you don't bully, fight or kill us for what our preferences are.

Lightning Ridge in 2019 has an expanding LGBTQI+ community and is now more accepting than ever before, it feels amazing to be able to walk around and be seen as a normal person in my hometown as it should always have been

I believe that communities in small/rural towns in Australia are less educated on LGBTQI+ they have the odd handful of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender people in those towns but sometimes it can be a very discrete life because of Homophobia and Transphobia from lack of LGBT+ education and resources.

There is less support in regional communities for the LGBTQI+ and I think we all need to make a change with educating in schools, just like how most schools both public and private schools teach scripture and have religious classes, I strongly believe that schools and community organizations should give the positive message that "it's okay to be LGBTQI+.

Smaller towns should celebrate pride and pride month to help make a small community gather and to set the image that being LGBT+ is supported.

As if on cue, and it certainly looks practiced, they place their hands on their asses and spread their check revealing their asshole. Gio is pink with a little darkening around the hole.Ray who has honey-coloured skin is he same all throughout the ass.)

Q Magazine: Gio, your hole is pink but the skin around it is a darker pink while your skin is lighter. Ray's colour on his bottom is consistent. Have you noticed? Why is that?

Gio: We noticed. The skin basically colours with age and turned a darker pink.

Q Magazine: With age or with use?

(Gio laughs but does not answer).

Q Magazine: You said you wanted to have the most famous hole in the world. How is that working out for you? Gio: I hope I'm getting there.

Big Jake: As a Harem boy he certainly gets to show it off a lot, to the audience at the shows or in the media, to reporters for magazines such Q Magazine. So I'd say his hole is fairly recognisable.

(Everyone laughs.)

Q Magazine: But Gio, aren't you ever embarrassed showing

off your hole? Knowing that the whole world can see it and recognise it. Apparently some people have also seen you having a butt wax. Doesn't that bother you?

Gio: Not at all. I say if you have it, flaunt it.

Q Magazine: But do you think prospective boyfriends would want to have their boyfriend's hole displayed for all to see? Gio: When you date someone it's the person you're with not their actions.

Q Magazine: What about a future job? Who will hire someone who is known for being a stripper and an escort? Gio: I thought of that and in future I'd like to open up my own business. That's the idea but I say let's wait and see. Q Magazine: But to come back to my question - what kind of job? In my research you have a degree in Economics, but you're a male dancer. Surely the only job would be in porn? No?



(Gio and Big Jake shift uncomfortably in their seats.)

Gio: It's important to be creative and do different things in life. The Harem Boys was a great experience. Perhaps we stay on for another year or do something different. Let's see.

Q Magazine: How much have you made? Big Jake: A lot!

Q Magazine: Enough to buy a house?

Big Jake: You need to remember that for the four months the show is running the boys lived here at the Harem Hotel for free. They received 75% of any escorting they did, setting their own prices. They received a generous package to perform on stage. Being a Harem Boy opens up a lot of doors as strippers, models, escorts, gogo boys, dancers and so on.

Q Magazine: But these jobs are not sustainable. Can they really make money that way even as they get older? Big Jake: As Gio said a moment ago, it's about being creative.

Q Magazine: Big Jake - what's it like swapping the military for a hotel of hot gay men and nude strippers?

Big Jake: Not that different actually. We have to be as disciplined here as in the army. In the army like here the men shower naked, they work out a lot and keep in shape and they are just as horny.

Q Magazine: Ray, you come from a conservative home. What do your friends and family make of you being a stripper who gets naked and even fucked on stage?

Ray: Not all my family are aware but those who are, are fully supportive and like it. Some of my friends have even come to watch the show! Q Magazine: What was their reaction?

Ray: They liked it. They said they were surprised I could dance like that. They were especially surprised to see me get pounded on stage. Q Magazine: Have they made comments about your manhood, specifically its size. Compared to the other boys you don't have the biggest tool in the shed.

(Ray shuffles uncomfortably in his seat. His penis flexes a little as we talk about it and I can see a drop of precum.)

Ray: I'd say what matters most is that my dick, any dick, looks good and is proportional to the body. In which case in relation to my height it's on par. It's about how you use it and being proud. I have a lot of confidence and make it work!

Q Magazine: Finally, what do you enjoy most about stripping?


Ray: I love the cheers from the audience and the dancing. Knowing that the guys watching are having a great time, that's a great motivator.






















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
