q feature: TARAS SEMENENKO

I met Taras through Evan Davis and enjoyed a lovely evening having dinner with the two of them. Upon meeting Taras I was impressed with his maturity, looks (obviously) and, once seeing a portfolio of his work, that too. We started our interview in the usual way:

Are you a Melbourne lad? Do you have any family here? Where did you go to school? Where do you currently live (city)? How old are you? Do you have a partner?

Yeah, I'm a local. My family has always lived in Melbourne. Every time I travel it just affirms how much I love living here. I did high school at PEGS in Keilor and then did a short stint at RMIT before doing my diploma of illustration at NMIT. I recently turned 26, and I'm living with some mates in Brunswick, Melbourne, which is mostly spectacular. I'm chronically single.

When did you first realise you were gay and did you have to endure any homophobia throughout your journey thus far (school, family, work, friends etc)?

I first started suspecting I was gay at about 13, I think. Up until then I mistook my attraction to guys as admiration, although my family figured it out well before I did. I've been really lucky with my family. Dad had gay friends in the past and one of my mum's brothers is gay, so to them it really wasn't anything shocking. Actually, the thing my sister struggled with most was how to pretend to be shocked at my coming out. I would have been about 15 or 16 when I came out, which I did because I needed a lift from my folks to a Minus18 event.

The challenging part for me was high school, although I don't remember ever being physically harassed. Most of my high school years were segregated with girls at another campus, but the theory that boys aren't as sly with their antagonism is bull. I remember the looks of fear and derision, and found them more spiteful than the hushed but pointed name calling, mostly because it's intangible. All in all, my memory of high school is somewhat vague.

Maybe it's a subconscious form of self-preservation, or perhaps just a lucky result of my affection for a glass of wine, but I met a guy a couple of years ago through friends who apologised for the way he treated me in high school and I honestly couldn't remember him. I think I couldn't place him not because his hostility didn't mean anything to me, but because it wasn't anything unusual to me at the time.

When did you first realise you had a talent for art? Did you have to do any study for same? Is this now your chosen vocation?

I loved colouring as a kid and I just never put down the pencils. Mum was a wedding dress designer, which inspired my sister Krystal to draw a lot, and I just wanted to do whatever my big sister was doing. I decided to study design, as opposed to fine art, because I thought it would be a more employable skill. It turns out I was wrong. Illustration wasn't the best fit for me as a career, but completing that diploma was the best thing I could have done to foster my talent. I'd truly love to make art my main vocation, but right now I'm also working in retail. My dad wants me to follow his footsteps into property development, which I wouldn't mind, but I could never give up art. I'm too introverted to express myself any other way.

Your exhibition coming up this month, is it your first and how did you go about securing Cyclone Gallery?

Yes this is my first solo show, and opening night is on the 17th September at Cyclone Gallery in South Melbourne. In the past I had looked at a number of smaller gallery spaces, and between upfront costs and commission fees, I felt that most were basically just trying to screw me. Then an incredible mate of mine Michel Cabré organised a meeting with Rod Fuller, the Curator of Cyclone Gallery, and he managed to negotiate an exhibition. I'm very excited, but I'm also crazy nervous about it. Cyclone Gallery has had really high calibre artists and well known names. Ken Done, Peter Russell-Clark, Charles Blackman and Bob Brown have all exhibited there which is pretty daunting stuff for a new guy. I'm incredibly flattered and grateful that they have chosen to exhibit my work. Some of the artworks I chose for the exhibition are pieces that I started years ago, so I feel the need to show them, get feedback, hopefully sell a few, and then move on with developing some new ideas.



What is your favourite style of painting and do you think you have found the style that you will stick with or is this an evolving aspect to an artist's life?

Definitely evolving. Stylistically, my paintings are far looser than my pen drawings. I think studying design, and having to work towards different creative briefs, expanded the styles that I work with. If I've spent an afternoon trying to perfect a detailed little drawing then I'm likely to snap a little and need to throw some paint around. Different mediums lend themselves more easily to certain styles, which is another reason I wanted to exhibit so that I could cluster the work I've done and then move on to new things without it all becoming a confused mess. I have been influenced by the precision and discipline of zoological and anatomical art. The diversity in animal species is a constant fascination for me, and I have a particular interest in species that seem to demonstrate a range of features more often associated with 'being human', rather than part of the animal world. So for this exhibition I've done a series of birds, as well as a variety of naive and abstract faces, and some wine glasses. When I recently stood back from it all, I realised that a lot of the artworks somewhat reflect the way I retreat when I hide away to create them. Hearing other people's interpretations is always fun for me, so I don't like giving away too much by explaining my artworks.

What advice would you give to any other young person questioning or knowing their sexuality as gay?

It gets better. Also, try to allow yourself to do what feels right without too much self-judgement. I've known I was gay for a long time, but only quite recently allowed myself the freedom to explore my sexuality. I didn't even register how repressed I was, because I had convinced myself that I wasn't a sexual person. Things that I never would have thought any less of others for doing, I restricted from myself out of shame. I'm glad to have finally put that shame to one side, and I'm trying to shape my life in the way that feels right to me.

My advice to another young person questioning their sexuality as gay, isn't to go on a whore rampage. But if you do, or if you don't, either way it's your choice but try to discern how your actions are affecting your sense of self. Every friendship, boyfriend, girlfriend, family member is temporary. You're the only person that you'll spend your entire life with. So put as much effort into getting that relationship as right as the rest.

And if you're a boy, and not in drag, don't wear bronzer.

Where to from here for Taras?

Hopefully to survive my September exhibition unscathed, work a lot more at my art, and try not to get too distracted with the whole affording rent issue. I also plan to get involved with the Midsumma festival, so my next few pieces will probably be more directly related to my sexuality.

I'm grateful for my current opportunity to learn more about the industry and the business side of things. So I plan to take what I've learned from this exhibition and try to do it all again.

The considerations and risks are obvious. Naturally you do without sick pay, holiday pay and your guaranteed employer super contribution. Also, depending on the type of work you do it can mean some time before you see a return on your outlay or investment and cash flow can be a big issue.

Time management is also a big issue for many self-employed people. Often there are not enough hours in the day, particularly when you just start your business. When you are your own boss you often find that you have to complete all the roles within your own business until you can afford to pay salaries to employees to help you with the work. Then there are your customer's expectations to meet...

Try to budget for your own wage from your cash flow and pay yourself super! You will want it one day. Watch your cash flow and don't spend your GST as you collect it. You will need to pay it to the government at some point.

For all this work, the remuneration when working for yourself is typically higher to offset the additional risks. It has been my experience that people are drawn to working for themselves chiefly to get a better return on the work they are currently doing for others. Very often individuals build up valuable networks that can provide them with sufficient work to sustain them in the industry that they have built their career and the initial attraction is the better reward. Being your 'own boss' fits into this too though consistently I think the drive for dollars comes first.

Setting your own hours and working conditions is another benefit of being self-employed. Should you wish to and can afford to, you can also opt out of work. Each individual and industry is different though this kind of flexibility is rarely something that is possible for people who are working full time jobs and hours. This is something I am obviously enjoying at the moment.

Though tricky at times, working hard in your own business can be a great way of creating wealth. A well built and maintained company with a good client base and robust business practices can be a very valuable and saleable asset.

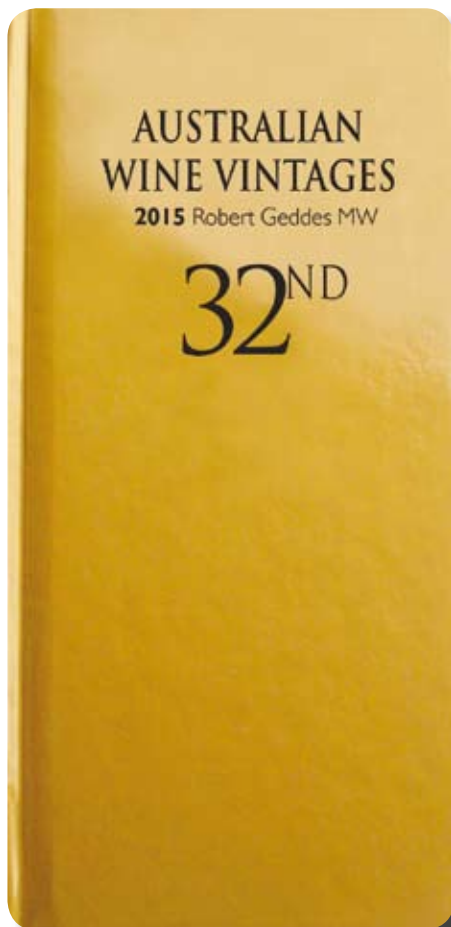

Stylish freshness with honey, dried fig, bread yeast evolving to nougat elements and complex fruited honey. Rich yet delicate, the creamy texture showing stylish complex nougat and creamed honey with mature fig on the finish balanced by apple acidity. It reveals more complexity with every sip. Now comes the hard part. They all look great in the photos. After all would you put a daggy picture in your ad? Not likely! You've only staying a couple of days so it's got to work. You're not on home turf, everything is different, there's a weird sound from the fridge and the toilet flush is too loud. So if you don't get into the zone straight away you've done your dough and you'll be more irritable when you leave than when you came.

The answer is TRUST. Does the landlord trust you as a tenant? Or do you get the feeling from their website that they expect the worst. That maybe they expect you to bring an extra suit case and make off with the linen and cutlery? If there are wall to wall beds, the TV is chained to the top of the cupboard and the decorating style is early laminate then you get the idea that you're not really welcome and you're better off staying home.

They don't provide too many pictures on the website as they don't want you looking into the dusty corners and there really isn't much to show anyway.

On the other hand, if there's a lot of information and pictures on the website and you get a peek into all the corners, the decorating style isn't post apocalypse then you stand a good chance of a relaxing time. Especially look for those small touches. Does the owner trust you with books, CDs, DVDs? Are there nick-knacks around? Is the kitchen stocked? Are there more than four plastic plates and glasses in the cupboards? What about heating and cooling? There's Wind Up My Barranco

Living in the Canary Islands, I quickly learned that most people living in Northern European countries have little time for our occasional complaints about the weather. After all, as an Ancient Greek once declared, we live in the "Fortunate Islands"; the weather is as near perfect as we can get in Europe, and survey after survey has proven that these islands are the healthiest places in the World to live.

Does this mean that we never complain about the weather? Sadly not; after all, due to our early conditioning as Brits, others, as well as myself still complain about the weather from time to time. It is part of who we are, and an important part of our collective national psyche. It may be complaints about the weather being too hot, which it often is in August, too windy in July and even too wet - albeit for about three days in February.

We live quite close to what is often billed as "The Windiest Place on Earth". That place is the village of Pozo Izquierdo, home of the World Windsurfing Championships, and the place to go to watch spectacular waves and to enjoy the surf. Well, it would have to be windy there, wouldn't it? After all, little or no wind would make for a very sad or non-existent World Windsurfing Competition. However, the downside is that sometimes the winds in the area are so strong that they carry sand, soil, dust and goodness knows what else to towns and villages across a large part of the island.

Occasionally, the wind is too strong to even take Bella, our dog, for more than just a very short walk on the open land outside our village, and I have often considered buying her some goggles in order to cope with the sand and dust, as it bites into our eyes as we walk. It is often challenging to face and walk against these strong winds, and I have occasionally seen children and small adults swept off their feet, as well as the occasional vehicle overturned on our busy motorway.

As far as weather is concerned, we are very fortunate and have little to complain about. q interiors: **with AARON WONG**

This issue, we continue the discussion on both natural and artificial light and how to take advantage of them. To evaluate light levels and light quality you must take note of the directional orientation of the building. This is a significant planning issue for architects and designers, as it not only has an effect on light levels but also on heat, shadows, and the choices of materials and finishes one may make for both exterior and the interior spaces.

One's perception of colour is also affected by light. Morning light is clear white, afternoon light can be gold or red. Warm light is also warmer in colour. Cool light can make things look slightly blue.

In the northern and southern hemispheres, northern and southern light characteristics are reversed. Southern light in the northern hemisphere is the warmer light that lasts most of the day. Houses with a southern orientation will have a longer arc of light as the sun moves through the sky. Houses in the southern hemisphere have this orientation if they face the northern light. A basic rule of thumb is that wherever you are standing on planet earth, if you are facing the equator the light will shine more evenly through the day and through the seasons.

In the same way, if the window orientation of a building is facing directly away from the equator the light will be cooler and will have a shorter arc through the day during most of the year. In either hemisphere the sun rises in the east and sets in the west. Think about how you would design window treatments or a space plan for a bedroom facing due east.

Now consider how differently you may feel about a breakfast room with the same orientation. How will that same room feel by the afternoon? If your windows face west you will see a redder or more orange light. A room with this orientation will be in shadow until the afternoon. This light is often warmer because the sun tends to heat up the air as the day goes on. If you are in a cool climate, that can be an advantage. So no matter where you are, if you are facing east you will see morning light, which is usually very clear and bright and EARLY.

If you are in a warm climate, western light may cause discomfort due to the extra warmth because both eastern and western light get very low to the horizon (when the sun is rising and when it's setting), the angle of light from both these orientations can reach very deep into a room.

You need to be aware of this when you specify window treatments, fabrics and the positioning of some art works.

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q drag: ISIS - MISS DRAG.NET 2014

Melbourne is blessed to have a continuing array of new drag talent. The latest to achieve stardom is Isis who took out the coveted prize as winner of the GH's first Drag.Net competition, which will become an annual event. Alan Mayberry asked Isis about the rocky road to stardom.

I grew up in Melbourne's quiet outer-eastern suburbs, going to a small primary school and a large high school. I never really fitted in anywhere or with anyone until the end of high school when I finally started to blossom. It wasn't until I finished my fashion course that I had some time and money to start thinking and building skills to start my exploration into drag.

While at primary school I was harassed for being effeminate and for hanging out with girls most of the time. 'Poof' and 'gay boy' were regular slurs directed at me. The harassment rarely got physical, but the bullying was hurtful — enough to make me become very insular and often very quiet to others.

During high school I performed in the musical productions and did well in the arts. Both drama and art is where I excelled and where my obvious passions lay. It's kinda a no brainer that I ended up being a drag queen. I had an inkling that I wanted to be a drag queen ever since I saw Robin Williams transform into Mrs Doubtfire. Her character inspired a solo piece for school entitled *Mrs Doubtfire in Oz*. Other films such as *Pricilla*, *Rocky Horror*, *Moulin Rouge*, *Paris Is Burning* and *Dream Girls* inspired me to look further into the realm of female impersonation entertainment.

When I was 17 my parents asked me if I was gay. However, I wasn't ready to admit it in myself at that point. I was still scared and worried of the implications and trouble it may cause during the rest of my schooling. At the end of Year 12, after I had turned 18, I came out to my parents and brother. At the beginning it was a difficult process. I left home for a few days, staying with a friend and her mother. She happened to understand, as she had come out 15 years prior and was very supportive. After I gave my parents time to process what I had told them and what I had waited for so long to tell them, I returned home. At first, it was at best, an awkward and anxious time for the whole family. After a while my parents, especially my father grew to accept and understand my homosexuality. The nail in the coffin, so to speak, was when I introduced my partner to him. Now my father gets along with my Ben more than me! Ben and I have been together for 3 years now and have a cheeky whippet named Klaus.

The first drag show I saw live was at The Peel with Paris, Rita and Miss Candee on the old central stage back in 2009. But wasn't until I finished my Fashion Course that I had some time and money to start thinking and building skills to start my exploration into drag. By that time *Ru Paul's Drag Race* had started to explode and one of my first outings as a queen was to see the 1st tour of Sharon Needles, a recent Drag Race winner.

My drag career is a little over a year now. My debut was on the Exchange main stage performing a *My Heart Will Go On* remix by Celine Dion. I had gone out before in a face and did a garage performance for a close friend's birthday. But *Destiny's Drag Race* was my first full-out performance on a stage. I was a bundle of nerves as I waited to go on. Luckily the performance went fabulously. I was even complimented on my model figure and Louboutains, as well as the performance! It was one of the best feelings to be appreciated and applauded for my drag debut. I was elated and became addicted. After 15 weeks in drag race I collected 2nd place and an invaluable experience to my drag career. I wouldn't trade it for anything. One of the best parts was meeting Amelia Mole in week 4 when she came to watch me, and then I met Pashion through Amelia and hooray our group Qween was born five weeks into Drag Race. Thanks for the name Millie Minogue!

Qween first started out performing at Argo Bar (formerly Heavens Door). Since then we have performed at birthdays, hens parties and many entertainment venues across Victoria. I would love to go on tour with Qween and show Australia our brand of drag! I have learnt so many performance skills from Pashion and Amelia and thank my lucky star that they saw a spark in me. Qween performs regularly at the Greyhound which, in my opinion, is the best drag stage in Australia.



Recently I entered the GH's Drag.Net competition. I competed in round four and took out the week with a saucy little number entitled *Pu\$\$y*. For the finals I produced an all-stops performance about many forms of love. Both fortunately turned out to be show-stopping performances, and I was crowned Miss Drag.Net 2014! I am still so elated and honored to have received the title. I can't wait to see what the next year has in store for me as performer and a Queen.

Drag today is an evolving and eclectic medium. While the drag performers are having to adapt to fewer stage opportunities, rising costs in make-up, wigs and costumes, we strive to bring the best to the punters. Drag has always been a tough industry, and more inventive methods of putting on shows will come about and the show will go on. Many young queens can learn from the best in the business and the recent Madonna show at the GH taught me a lot with Jessica James at the helm.

I gain a lot of inspiration from around me. I am inspired by movies, art, singers and their songs as well as fashion and other queens, past and present. Sometimes an idea will be abstract and I'll have to mull over it and I will see it or the idea will form in my mind almost instantly. Other times it will be a linear thought process while I designing different aspects of the performance.

I'm very lucky to have such a very understanding partner. He knows how passionate and how much I enjoy performing drag. He sometimes wishes I didn't have to go out to a gig but we get to have our movie dates and dinners. Sometimes he gets a little over it all, but he just brushes it off. I'm so lucky he is so very supportive and patient like that. I like to go for long leisurely dinners with friends or cook sweets. Coming from an Italian background I'm rather fond and good at cooking. I also enjoy watching marathons of seasons such as *Game of Thrones*, *Will and Grace* and *Ru Paul's Drag Race*, to mention a few. Going to art galleries and exhibitions is always good to keep my inspiration and eyes fresh.

In five years time I would like to be settled into my own couture business and perform regularly whether it be with a troupe or solo gig. I seem to be in a natural state when I'm on the stage and I like being on it, and it seems to like me too. I really admire the work of Paris, Tabitha Turlington, Millie Minogue and Nova China. All 4 have their own unique drag style and beautiful personalities. All are always totally professional and know their stuff when it comes to the art of drag. I look up to them and aspire one day to be regarded as a similar top Melbourne queen.

I am so proud of how far I have come in the past year and the friends and connections I've made. My thanks to all who helped guide me and support my work. I am eternally grateful. I wish to keep inspiring and entertaining audiences with my passionate performances.

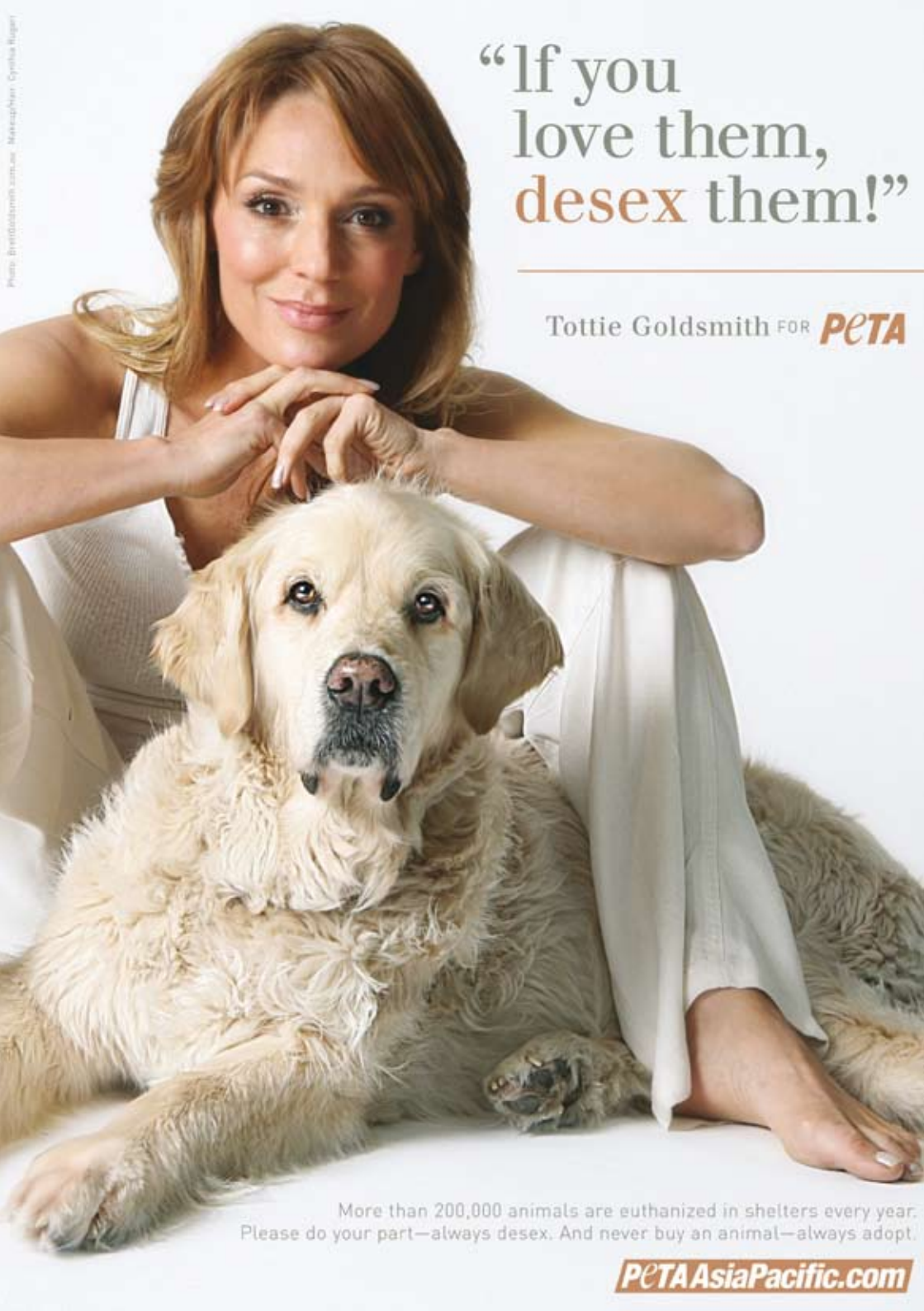

q health: **with KEREN WIGLEY**

HIDDEN DANGERS AND DIET PRODUCTS

Terry came to see me in clinic a few years ago. He was on crutches, and putting any weight on his right foot caused excruciating pain. He had spent more than 3 years going to Doctors and Specialists, none of whom could help any more. He had tried many medications, most of them leaving him feeling worse in other ways and only masking the pain temporarily. Aspartame food ingredient codes are: 950 & 951. Products containing Aspartame can make you crave carbohydrates, increasing the likelihood of weight gain. They contain formaldehyde, which stores in the fat cells, particularly in the hips and thighs. Formaldehyde is a toxin and is used primarily to preserve 'tissue specimens.' Aspartame is especially dangerous for diabetics. Aspartame toxicity may mimic symptoms of retinopathy. Aspartame also affects the blood sugar. Diabetics may suffer acute memory loss due to the fact that aspartic acid and phenylalanine are neurotoxic when taken without the other amino acids necessary for a good balance.

Aspartame passes the blood/brain barrier and is linked to neurological disorders as it can affect the neurons of the brain with the potential to cause various levels of brain damage, including seizures, depression, manic depression, panic attacks, uncontrollable anger and rage. It is possible that people who have been diagnosed with MS and similar conditions actually have Aspartame poisoning. Many children, and adults, diagnosed with ADD and ADHD had complete turnarounds in their behaviour when these chemicals were removed from their diet.
