The Sidney Myer Fund and the GALFA Board of Directors are pleased to announce our next joint funding round, as part of the Sidney Myer Fund Poverty and Disadvantage Small Grants Program, to the value of \$15,000.

This grant round will focus on improving the wellbeing of LGBTI 1 people living with a disability.

We encourage projects that are collaborations between disability advocacy and LGBTI groups, and from States and Territories other than Victoria.

The projects should aim to assist LGBTI people living with a disability in any of the following areas:

Reducing isolation Recognising multiple identities including Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander or multicultural

Building community capacity

Enhancing cultural engagement and development

Building evidence

Improving LGBTI inclusive practice in services.

Applicants should focus on projects over a 1-2 year period through either: Community development

Education initiatives

Applied, community-led research with tangible outcomes in the field Events or conferences

Applicants must submit an expression of interest by email to GALFA using the appropriate form by 5pm Monday 5th March 2018. Those short listed will be advised by 23rd March and will be invited to submit a full application using the Sidney Myer Fund online application system by 27th April 2018. The successful applicant will be advised in June, with the project to start no earlier than 1st July 2018.

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## q travel: with BARRIE MAHONEY

Barrie Mahoney was a head teacher and school inspector in the UK, as well as a reporter in Spain, before moving to the Canary Islands to launch and edit a new English language newspaper. He enjoys life in the sun as a columnist and author, and continues to write a series of popular novels and books for expats.



### 'Living in Spain and the Canary Islands' – A New Book by Barrie Mahoney

What a year 2017 has been for British immigrants living in Europe, as well as for those hoping to make a new home in the sun. Since I wrote the first 'Letter from the Atlantic' as a newspaper reporter in 2004, so many things have changed. When my partner and I moved to the Costa Blanca, it was a time of great optimism and exciting possibilities. The exchange rate meant that the British living in Europe were getting a very favourable deal. Property prices in Spain were realistic, and for many people the opportunity of a new life in the sun became a reality and not just a dream.

It was also a time when British entrepreneurs established new and successful businesses in the Costas, and Spain was grateful for the investment and made newcomers welcome. It was a time when it seemed that nothing could halt the enthusiasm of the British for a new life in Spain.

Then there was the financial crash, later to be followed by the EU referendum and what has since become known as 'Brexit'. Looking back, it should have been obvious that the pound was severely over valued for many years, and that many Brits were living in a 'fool's paradise' that would eventually come to an abrupt end. There was rapid devaluation of house prices, leading to negative equity and financial chaos for many who had over extended themselves when buying a property in Spain. A number of British owned businesses in Spain collapsed, leaving many disillusioned and with little option other than to return reluctantly to the country of their birth.

The result of the referendum, initiated by the then Prime Minister, David Cameron, went badly wrong from the point of view of many Brits living in Spain. The result of the referendum was accompanied by a fall in the value of the pound, and left many with a reduction of around 20 per cent of the income that they were used to. Pensioners, and those on a low income were the first to feel the initial impact of the decision to leave the European Union, and for a time it seemed that the rush to leave Britain for a sunnier future had ground to an abrupt halt, as the electorate began to take stock of their new position outside the European Union.

My new book, 'Living in Spain and the Canary Islands' goes back to the beginning of the year with a series of letters that reflected and expressed the mood at the time. Confused as to what the future would bring, there were often angry, and sometimes depressed conversations in bars, restaurants and all areas of British social life in Spain and the Canary Islands, which is where I currently live. Estate agents were gloomy and removal companies were reporting a sudden resurgence in business, as many Brits were leaving Spain and heading back to the UK. Of course, many of the elderly and sick could not do this, because they had neither the resources, good health or inclination to deal with what would be for many a traumatic return to life in the UK. I also doubt that many would survive the rapid drop in temperature either.

The political climate is changing once again. As I look back over these turbulent 12 months, I know that many businesses, banks, estate agents and removal companies in Spain are reporting a greater positivity and enthusiasm from those who are still longing to move from the UK to Europe. For many, the EU referendum has confirmed what they already knew; that they are firstly European and not just British. Politically, many dislike what they see as a new anti-European order within the British political establishment and have decided to vote with their feet.

As well as retirees looking to fulfil their dream of heading for a healthier life in the sun, young people are seeing their future as still being part of the bigger European dream. Despite significant changes, there are new realisations for British people hoping to make a new life within a country of their choosing, and not just the territorial constraints created by an accident of birth.

It is true that many of the opportunities and freedoms have narrowed since myself and many others began our new lives in Spain, as well as other parts of Europe. The opportunities provided by the freedom of movement to live and work in any country across this exciting and inspiring continent are the envy of many across the world and should not be lightly overlooked. Life is short; if you have the enthusiasm and the means, my best advice is to grasp every opportunity to 'live your dream'.

### CREATING FAMILIES VIA SURROGACY - A GIVE & TAKE

Cass Lake's generosity in carrying a child for gay couple Juan & Christian inspired them to donate their sperm and left-over embryos to others in need.

For Juan, now 36 years old, the man of his dreams had always been someone keen to bring up a family. It was a topic raised in his first week dating Christian. They quickly came to realise both shared the same dream - two children – one biologically connected to each. Now settled in Sydney, their journey to reach this goal has taken them around the world several times.

Juan & Christian had a boy born via a difficult surrogacy process in Mexico in 2015. They had tried for two children, but only Juan's sperm had produced embryos that (after many tries) led to a healthy baby boy, Anxo.

Back in Sydney after their Mexico experience, they heard about the Australian Surrogacy Community- a large Facebook group where altruistic surrogates and intended parents can 'self-match'. The couple joined, thinking one day to locate an Australian surrogate to perhaps carry that second child.

Posting an irresistible image of themselves and Anxo, the close-knit surrogate community was soon abuzz with discussion. Within two weeks Cass, a mother of three from the mid North NSW Coast had offered to carry their longed for second child. Given most looking at domestic surrogacy take years to find a surrogate, if they do at all, such good fortune was extra-ordinary.

"We weren't really ready" Juan admits, but it was too good an offer to turn down. What followed was a visit to the tiny village of Tinonee outside Taree to meet Cass and her family. She and her



three children, now 10, 8 and 6 years made a short video for their new gay friends. Her eldest boy did the commentary, declaring they couldn't wait to help Juan and Christian. The boys would chat with Cass via Messenger for hours at a time as well as plentiful Skype calls.

But there was a catch - there was only so long Cass was prepared to put her life on hold to carry. She wanted the embryo transfer to occur in March 2017, with the hope that if it worked, she would deliver by Christmas.

By late January 2017, while Juan & Christian, their surrogate and her partner had completed the legal and psychological counselling, their plans to re-engage Anxo's South African egg donor had come unstuck. The Australian government was refusing to grant her a visa to travel.

Fortuitously, late the year prior, they had met another Sydney gay couple and their egg donor Amber at a kids' party. They had got to chatting and Amber had ultimately suggested that if needed, she would donate her own eggs. In early February they made contact again. Amber remained willing. However the logistics were complex.

They had already committed to a Brisbane IVF clinic (as only this clinic accepted South African egg donors), but Juan & Christian were in Sydney, Amber in Melbourne and Cass four hours up the coast. Their IVF team needed to synchronise their donor and surrogate menstrual cycles. Luck was on their side and they successfully created nine embryos.

Cass first embryo transfer took, but the next 20 weeks proved really tough, with constant nausea and vomiting. With Juan & Christian both working, they could only drive up to Tinonee on weekends. The hamlet had no access to take-away restaurants, so they couldn't even arrange for meal deliveries for Cass's family. Instead Juan cooked and froze as many meals as they could fit in a huge esky and drove north, to take the meal preparation off Cass' hands for a few weeks.

On 5 December, Cass had an extended 24 hour labour in Manning River Hospital and lost three litres of blood in the process. As Juan held their newborn son, Cass was rushed into theatre to stem the blood loss. While keen to complete another surrogacy journey, Cass' doctors have advised that another birth would be just too risky for her own health.

What advice would Juan & Christian give gay singles and couples considering Australian surrogacy?

"You need to really put yourself out there, be appreciative of every single effort made by members of the surrogacy community, be genuine, don't take people's kindness for granted - give back."

What Juan & Christian could give was sperm and embryos. So they joined another online group Sperm Donation Australia, selecting five couples in need of sperm – one in Tasmania, two in Sydney, one in each of Brisbane and Melbourne.

As for embryos, they have eight still in Brisbane and were keen to donate them. Their donor put them in touch with a Melbourne heterosexual couple to whom they are donating four of these.

While embryo donation remains a process heavy with redtape and further counselling in the Australian context, Juan & Christian remain determined to help.

Juan & his partner are just one of 34 Australian parents and surrogates who will share their extra-ordinary journeys at Families Through Surrogacy's February seminar series across six Australian capital cities between 10 -16 February 2018.

These aim to assist those considering surrogacy with crucial

Life is an epic journey and most people have experienced many incredible highs and some challenging low points along the way.

Often the road to the future is punctuated by challenging and difficult circumstances, deep grief or trauma. Life is not discerning between those who have and those who have not and in reality, nobody escapes unscathed and it becomes part of their growth and learning. However during those past times, the vision of the future may have been obscured by circumstances beyond their control, lack of direction, losing sight of personal goals or being unable to achieve them because of others. For some, the overwhelming burden of grief, regret or guilt added a weight which made it difficult to keep going forward. Or perhaps feelings of frustration, resentment, loss of control or being stuck added to the load.



Happiness is everyone's birthright and at some point many people made a decision to reclaim their personal power. Although it took a lot of courage, they took steps to achieve it, setting emotions aside, or navigating their way out of the situation that was keeping them down. With courage and determination, they launched into their desired future with renewed vigour, determination and purpose.


Fast-forward through the struggles, like the butterfly coming out of the cocoon, to their future. As they looked back over their life they saw that all of the stepping stones developed them in ways that they would never have imagined and contributed to the success and happiness that they now enjoyed, going from strength to strength. Life is good and there is no need to work through old forgotten emotions and issues. They seem so far away.

But are they? Over time, especially if combined with the accumulative effect of ongoing stress, the body makes a decision (unknown to them) that it is time to empty the trash and the only way to communicate this to them is in a physical way. In a seemingly perfect world they begin to experience inexplicable symptoms, usually in the weakest link in the genetic chain. These are signals from the body. At first occasional, and then constant physical or emotional symptoms. Perhaps anxiety attacks, depression, unexplained fears, challenging dreams, digestive disorders, sensitivities, headaches, muscular aches and pains, burn-out, feelings of vulnerability, fragility, uncertainty about the future, diminishing self-confidence. Every time they try to walk their path, they feel as though there is an invisible net holding them back. It is at this point that they often seek medical intervention, and add a pharmaceutical prescription to the physical and emotional toxicity in the body. In response, the symptoms may ease however the body begins to shout at them as it becomes overloaded. They cannot understand or listen, often blame it on the aging process, and the underlying problem gets worse until a real condition develops.

Their body has decided it is time to stop, deal with all of the underlying issues so that they can heal emotionally and be happy again. Often they have forgotten how it feels to be really happy, that feeling of freedom, laughing out loud and feeling so good that they want everyone to feel the same way. The personal goals that they set for themselves a few years ago are still burning and they want them to become reality. Every time they look at them and think "Can I?" the answer is a resounding "No!". Their body has begun to shut them down and it becomes increasingly difficult to do all of the things they want to do. They may experience a sense of denial and try to soldier on although it gets harder and harder.

It is usually at this point that a friend will mention Kinesiology to them or they will become aware of it in some way.

This is the only modality that gives them the ability to talk directly to their body via the practitioner who acts as an interpreter to identify the issues that need to be resolved.










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
