q feature: CELEBRATING DIVERSITY

Jason “Farmer” Clark is certainly an interesting character - and not shy at all. I first met Jason when he was helping out at a Commercial Road night club and again when he started working at the Stingo Hotel. We became very close friends very quickly and have (to my delight) maintained that friendship ever since. In conversation over this time, I found Jason’s life to be very interesting so I jumped at the chance to speak candidly with him about his life, work, and being a Gay boy from the country. I started this interview by asking him where he came from.

I was born, grew up, and went to school in a place called Camperdown in Western Victoria, did my further education in Cobden, moved on from there and did an agricultural course, a sports medicine course, and then started working in Ballarat. I was there for nearly a year, got promoted to foreman, at the same time getting involved with a hotel in Darlington - so I would commute between the two - and eventually moved into the Elephant Bridge Hotel (Darlington) which is the oldest continuous hotel in Victoria - opened in 1842 and has never been shut. I was there for eight years while maintaining my work in Ballarat then moved a little closer to home and built a land fill for a company in Melbourne, went back to my previous work once that had been completed to build a 145 house lot sub-division on Geelong Road in Ballarat, finished that job as foreman, the pub was sold, moved to Bendigo (at a Gold mine) then John Holland poached me to work on the East-link tunnel (so I moved into an apartment in Clifton Hill).

So you never had any desire to pursue more stereotypical Gay work e.g. hairdressing, interior design etc?

No!

So you have always had a propensity toward the more “butch” lines of work?

Yes! I am good with my hands [smirks].

Obviously people come out at different times in their lives. When did you know you were Gay?

Certainly when I was younger, in the country, I didn’t have any idea what “Gay” was. No idea. I would look at boys and think they were very cute, and it sort of got the better of me. When I was in Ballarat the feelings got more intense, then when I moved to Melbourne, I went to the Prince of Wales Hotel, picked someone up one night and had my first Gay sexual experience.

Had you experimented with girls prior to this?

When I was in Camperdown I had a girlfriend for

nearly three years, and when I was in Darlington at the pub, umm let’s say I was a bit of a skank [giggle].

So was there ever a time when that was a battle? Being in the country, having feelings for guys and not knowing how to deal with those feelings?

It was frustrating, and I thought there was something wrong with me. There was no one around who I even knew was Gay, didn’t know anything about “Gay” - I thought I was the only one. But no one knew if I was or wasn’t. A lot of people still say to me today that they don’t believe I am Gay. I’m sure however there are a lot of people who could vouch that I am [laugh].

Once you had come out, how was that accepted by your family, friends, acquaintances etc?

It couldn’t have been accepted better! Right through to my Grandmother, my Nan, the whole family...I still think a lot of them still don’t actually quite believe the fact because they think a Gay person should act in a certain way, but I was accepted and never had a problem.

I couldn’t wish for a better family or upbringing. I look back now and think how easy it was. The only stress in my life was the fact that I thought there was something wrong with me.



Did you ever have thoughts of self harm?

No...I always rose above that. The jobs that I seemed to put myself into were pretty intense, long hours, dealing with people all the time...I sort of didn't have much time to think about it. I tried to put it behind me.

So given all of that, what would you say to a young person growing up in rural or regional Australia who might be going through what you went through?

I don't know. I think it is good the way I did it as I worked things out for myself.

A lot of times you see a car accident (or something similar) where someone has died, and sometimes I think back now, thinking of the tendencies of the person involved and it sticks in my mind that maybe it wasn't an accident after all.

Do you think it has become easier for kids in the bush now given the increased number of Gay characters on television, radio, and press?

Certainly! It's got to get out there cause there's nothing wrong with you at all, although some people will say that there is, and I think it is starting to move around a lot more - people are becoming more aware of what is happening in the world and more accepting and the world is changing. It is getting easier and hopefully the people in the country can see that and have someone to talk to about it all. The internet is a great source of information (although I never got into it myself) and things generally are more accessible now than they were for me, but I still think there are a lot of people who don't make it through the journey.

Given your choice of work, have you ever found any problems being openly Gay in the workplace?

Occasionally I get the odd sort of snigger or remark, but at the end of the day they look and realise that I am not any different from them. I operate the same machines as them, running sites, controlling teams of guys, I have a lot of responsibility and I'm out there doing it as well - not sitting in an office demanding things to be done. I have always been very hands on when I have done jobs and try to involve as many people as I can and keep communication as much as I can as I believe if you're in contact with everyone a lot of the time, you don't seem to have problems with people

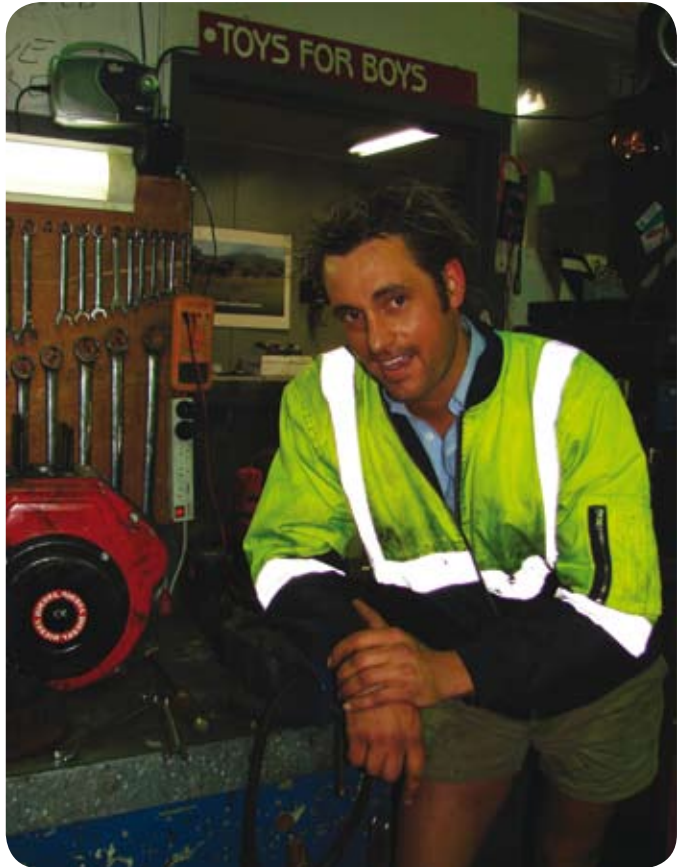
getting out of touch, getting out of rhythm, and getting their backs up against things, so I think the more you can stay close to people and in touch with people in a working environment (or personal) - whichever you are in - it tends to keep the group together. They tend to learn something off you and you off them in return.

As an openly Gay man in a less than stereotypical working scenario, what advice would you give others contemplating the same sort of path (in particular the question of whether one should come out or stay in the closet etc)?

You don't have to run around with a big sign on your hat saying "I am Gay", but you've got to make sure that you stick to what you are and don't try to hide the fact and don't try to shelter the fact - where you have to hide and be careful of what you say or do - questioning yourself all the time. You've just got to go with your gut and make sure that what you are doing is right, and if you think you are doing the right thing, everyone else will probably think the same.

So being Gay to you (if we could paraphrase it) is simply your sexuality and not a lifestyle "choice"?

Exactly....you are absolutely right. You are another part of the team. There are a lot of people on earth and I am sure there are a lot who haven't come out and every day of their lives when they wake up, they know exactly what they want to do but they don't do them - so they live a sheltered life and end up being very miserable.



Q money: with EVAN DAVIS

Q'day and welcome to the first instalment of Q Money. Together we will be exploring different aspects to money and our personal finances. Recently many clients, friends and loved ones have asked me for advice on credit cards. The humble credit card has to be one of the most used, abused and little understood financial products available. That said they do have their place as an extremely useful financial tool when used properly.

On applying for my first credit card my father said "Credit cards are like razor blades; you can shave with them or cut your throat wide open!" The reason for this dire warning is credit cards allow the consumer to purchase an item or service on credit. That is to say someone else's money.

The full or partial payment is then generally due in 55 days depending on the provider. If the payment is not made in full then credit card balances (debts) then payable on the outstanding balance. So what? Buy now and pay later - great! Credit card interest rates vary enormously. Some credit cards attract interest rates of well over 20%! With very high interest rates you may quickly find that a significant chunk of your income is simply paying your credit card interest each month.

Some credit cards come with a rewards program. Check the details and costs of these rewards carefully. The benefit you get from them may not always warrant the extra cost. Generally, these cards attract higher annual fees and interest rates. A card with no fees may suit you just as well and save you money.

There are now dozens of transfer cards available. These offer extremely low or even zero interest for a certain period of time on balances (debts) transferred from other banks. These products can be useful for bringing an existing debt under control. Though watch out, often new purchases on these cards may attract a higher interest rate than the amount transferred. Also lenders may approve you for higher limit than you need. Always be careful. Don't over spend and have a budget in place. Without a plan of attack people often transfer the debt and then it grows on the new card.

When used properly however, credit cards can be extremely useful. A savvy consumer can make all their purchases on their credit card, meaning they won't attract excessive transactions on their savings

account. This strategy can greatly reduce the fees you pay your bank. The prerequisite to this strategy working is always paying your credit card off entirely before the due date. Therefore you will NOT be paying any interest on the card. Having a set budget helps this process no end. Credit cards also offer flexibility of payment and for some people the reward programs can be a great bonus.

Perhaps the greatest benefit to a credit card is you'll never be lonely again. Just try missing a couple of payments and all sorts of people will start calling you. Just kidding, don't shave too close!

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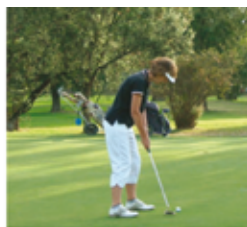

A monthly review of the world of Food, Bars, and Wine



When you think Melbourne region wineries, it's always to the east and south east that our mind travels. Immediately one conjures up images of the Yarra Valley in the winter with open fires, crisp, foggy mornings and gallons of excellent red, or Mornington Peninsula in spring/ summer with beaches nearby, lazy days in the sun lounging over a few bottles of cool climate whites and lashings of fresh seafood.

Rarely does the mind wander, however, to Sunbury. Yes, Sunbury in the North West of Melbourne.

The region extends from East Keilor to Bacchus Marsh, Craigieburn to Riddells Creek and produces some absolute quality grog.

Goonawarra in Sunbury was established way back in 1863 by the then Premier, JG Francis. As well as producing some quality booze (their cabernet merlot is a ripper), an old bluestone building serves as a great venue for a function.

Bacchus Hill is in the Bacchus Marsh Valley amongst market gardens. In a lush cold climate environment, this very new venture has a lot to offer. They have a tantalizing array of local produce, delectable provender products, and mouth watering fresh gelati, at the cellar door, looking out over the winery complex. The cellar door has been opened a year and is worth the 45 minute drive from the GPO.

Galli Estate in Rockbank is now 10 years old and produces some sensational wines. Their 2004 Pint Noir is a jaunty little number. Some intense fruit on the palate combined with a mossy oak finish really strikes a great balance and at \$16 a throw, it's worth grabbing a case, as it will age nicely over the next 3-4 years or you can hoick it down the screech now with some roast pork.

Ten minutes north of Tullamarine Airport is Yuroke Vineyards. Reaching 900 feet above sea level, Yuroke Vineyards has 360 degree views including a magnificent city skyline view. They grow predominantly reds and their 02 Shiraz is an absolute cracker. It is an award winner and the vines have been planted for about 10 years and are starting to show some maturity now. The cellar door is in progress, so try and get hold of these wines if you can.

Next time you are thinking that you want a wine trip, travel 45 minutes the other way and sample what the Sunbury region has to offer. There is also some great dining at some of the 20 vineyards, especially what is on offer at Witchmount Estate's Avanti. It boasts a modern Italian cuisine and I recommend the boned quail that are chargrilled and politely plopped on a magnificent polenta. Add that to their world beating Shiraz announced recently and I think you will be more than pleased with their offerings.

Oh and the booze is all good – cold climate style wines in beautiful surrounds - see you in Sunbury.

My mantra that morning as we putted down the river was, "I'm not going to die in the jungle. As I caught the jungle bus, then airplane to Cusco it became "I'm not going to die in Peru. Now you think that was scary? What do you think three days and surgery in a Peruvian Hospital is like? That was much scarier. I had great trouble explaining what plant had poisoned me. "La Planta Blow Dart" I said. Unfortunately we were at an elevation of 12,000 feet so no one had heard of blow darts here.

I had left my suitcase at the hotel, and the Andes Ambulance took me to an old hospital partly encased in Incan walls. All I thought to carry like any good traveler was my pouch holding my money, passport and thankfully a small Queecchua phrasebook. Queecchua is the language of the Inca's. It is still spoken throughout Peru.

I was hooked up to an I.V. of drugs with dangerously long Spanish names.. I waited till it was time for extraction of the broken darts. No one spoke English. My spanish was basic, so I began to talk to the nurses and doctor in Queecchua... 'Nama wasaan maki maki. I am in pain hand, hand. I cried. Allichu ama chyta ruwaychu. Please don't do that!' 'Chaki washan I am thirsty. It sounded a lot like Japanese. It was a dark comedy of which I couldn't escape. I had a very kind nurse at night and a mean Nurse Hattchett type by day. I woke up in the middle of surgery, and swore my head off. (in English) until they knocked me out good and proper for half the night. I knew I had to get out of there, 'Rapido'. My lungs were not affected by the poison. I figured by this time I had nothing to lose so I basically shouted up a storm. My voice could be heard in the graves of the Incan Kings buried down the road.

Two hours latter I was out of there and ready to continue my vacation. I had spent a fortune getting here, I had dreamt of coming to this country for a long time. I was going to enjoy this holiday, if it was the last thing I did.

My extraordinary journey to Machhu Picchu, Lake Titicaca and the Inca Valley will be expressed in another story at another time I arrived back in The States a month later with red spotty hands, a damaged liver and gratefulness for my life I'd forgotten I could feel.

My health has returned even better, after many months of herbs, health food and no beer. I have lost my Australian palate for alcohol, I just don't like it. If that isn't some sort of miracle I don't know what is! Thanks for reminding me Little Bit. This is the first time I have written this experience down. I certainly had no plans to relive all that in my mind. It feels good to let that memory out. Who knows what sort of weird phobia I could have developed over it? Fear of trees perhaps or fear of adventure, how awful!

Ok so now back to Little Bit and his story. He shares his home Winston and Sara, two special Highland terriers. They both love Little Bit. He can wander high and low and he is always safe with them. However, Winston particularly loves to hunt. 'Squirrels, mice, birds, anything that moves in the desert...He tells me 'I'm pretty good, and I have to taste my kill. 'That's probably why I throw up from time to time, he says.

Mary mentions Winston has a bad time in the car. "He barks like crazy. It's like he is having an anxiety attack. He really is difficult. Please ask him what's going on." Winston answers, "I need to be told every thing. Absolutely everything! I do not like not knowing what's going on. I'll try anything. I love adventures, I may be a dog, but I like to be treated as an equal being. Love goes along way. I love my life here, but Animals have Rights that most humans have never considered."

John enters in the midst of our conversation. I catch him up on everything and we discuss what type of bird Little Bit would like as his new feathered friend. Little Bit has convinced everyone, that was going to help him stop plucking his feathers. I get a picture once again in my head. I see a beautiful little female bird. 'It's small and it's green. Not pale green, bright green. I say. 'Oh my God! Splutters John. "When I broke up a relationship, nine years ago, we split up everything. We had 2 birds. I took Little Bit and she got Baby Bird. Baby Bird was small and bright green." "Was that when he started pulling his feathers out John?" I asked. "Yes it was, he replied. We all looked at Little Bit in astonishment. He had lost his love nine years ago and had never forgotten.

I serenade Little Bit with some Cell Singing. I am strangely humbled as I stand before this sentient being. I feel like I'm in some sort of Galactic Talent Show. Giving it my all, I share my sounds and I am mesmerized by his presence. Music is one great way to reach any species. Winston and Sara hear it as a lullaby, and fall into a deep healing sleep. As I am standing up to leave, I put my handbag over my shoulder. "Bye now" Little Bit says to me. "Bye now Little Bit," I reply. Nine days later I am quite surprised when I get a call from Mary. She sounded very upset. "Liza I got a little green bird for Little Bit. He's so happy. Winston is calm in the car now, it's great, but as soon as he saw the new bird he went crazy. He wants to kill her. He's so strong I could hardly control him. What will I do? She asks. 'Did you tell Winston you were getting a birdfriend for Little Bit? I ask. No, it didn't occur to me. 'You know he needs to know everything that's going on, absolutely everything. 'Oh no! 'He's furious I can feel it. The first thing you have to do is go outside and apologize to him for not sharing such an important decision with him,' I advise. 'Have a talk and explain why there is a new green bird. Separate them, and I'll be over tomorrow. I add. I cross my fingers and send a telepathic explanation to Winston and a 'Hang in there, to the new bird.

It didn't take long the next day to settle everything down. I talked to everyone, explained it all very, very clearly. I got a promise from John to take Winston hunting (a hike in the desert, looking for any creature that moved). Apparently it had got his juices flowing thinking about Baby Bird in a murderous way for the last 24 hours. I got a promise from Winston that he would leave the bird alone. One of the best things to happen to me was to discover when I was 18, that I was homosexual.

My coming out was non-traumatic, probably because I had good self esteem, and partly because then, as now, I am a completely self centred arrogant prick. "He's such a 'me' person" pretty accurate, but if it's so terrible, what's the alternative? Thought so! One of the good things about coming out young (ish) is that we develop the social skills required to facilitate a gracious and polite attitude to journey through life with all of the vagaries of communal living and intimate engagements. Coming early can have draw-backs, but none of them seem to be significant. Not a lot of cash, career uncertainty, tendency to have too much sex etc.

On the other hand coming out later in life whilst frequently a lot more traumatic, is also laden with other consequences. Many older Gay men and Lesbians who come out later in life have to re-establish themselves in their personal and family relationships, and also with the rest of sentient creation. It is a monumental task. I have so much admiration for them in this endeavour. There is however an awkwardness that accompanies the recently discovered sexual identity of older people. Recently I have had experiences that have brought this to the forefront of my mind, because as much as I acknowledge that I am not the most sensitive person around, I do sometimes wish I didn't have to react so bluntly.

I've just had a rush of old men who have just come out try to pick me up, in the most vulgar circumstances. Because I am a 'little bit' older and slim, the more rotund and hirsute, elderly and recently gayed try it on me because I am not a pretty strut-slut, and as a slightly older male, I must be interested in anything else that is male. They also perceive "no thanks" as "be more persistent"

This has driven me to distraction lately, and it begs the question, what is acceptable behaviour in these matters? I like to think self respect is a good indicator. I frequently try to look at myself objectively and rationalise my behaviour (believe me, I am good at this), cuing in the rain to get into some poxy venue at 1am is not a good sign of self respect. Let this be our guide, self respect is good.

Sometimes when at some of these venues I look

at the wilting wall-flowers of lonely old men, and hope they find something like vintage men, it's a wonderful community group, I have come to know many of them recently and I love them, one day I will be with them (if they'll let me). There are many community groups and good venues for us more mature people, old men in teeny bopper venues is so not a good look.

Gay men who have been out for a reasonable time have learned the social skills and know what's regarded as acceptable behaviour. All power to the latent homosexual, and good on you all for discovering this aspect of your life and changing. I have only heard two instances of Homosexuals discovering they were actually not homosexual in later life, and they were both lesbian women, who fell in love, and got married (to men). The older people in our community are a total inspiration, I have so much respect for them, in particular Vintage Men, The Matrix Guild, and, my total favourite is POW - the Performing Older Women's Circus, how's that for breaking down stereotypes. They're awesome and when I grow up, that's exactly what I want to be like.

Our Great American Adventure

We had wanted to visit friends in Canada for several years but kept putting it off because of the expense. Our friends were now talking about moving back to Australia, so we decided it was now or never. Now if you're going all the way to Canada from Australia, you might as well visit the USA at the same time and take in some of the sights! We decided to do a road trip taking in some of the places we had always wanted to visit.

Where to start...we visited our friendly local travel agent and looked at the possibilities. One of the cheapest ways to fly was via Guam and Hawaii... what a hardship! As keen divers we thought it would be a fantastic opportunity to spend a few days diving around Palau (a short island hop from Guam) and perhaps take in Hawaii on the way back. We put our deposit down and had ten months to start saving madly for the trip.

September arrived and it was time to go! Saying a sad goodbye to our beloved pets, we packed warm woolies for Canada, shorts, T-shirts and our dive gear for Palau and Hawaii, and of course all our camera gear and a lap-top. Used to travelling light we were appalled by all the luggage, and started unpacking some stuff thinking we could buy a few things as we needed them. The suitcases were a little less heavy – but it still looked as if we had enough luggage for 50 drag queens putting on a show with 10 costume changes each!

Enough already of the preparation! What about Palau? Well, it's just beautiful. We got picked up from the airport in a mini-bus. It was already very late and with the tiny twisting roads, we expected a scary trip to our hotel, but the driver took off at a sedate 20 miles per hour (around 30 k.p.h.) and we cruised our way gently into the night, having a fascinating conversation about his life on Palau. Like many of the hospitality workers, he was from the Philippines and had come to Palau for a better life.

In the morning we awoke to a beautiful day with gorgeous views across the bay. The climate is similar to Cairns and the seas are warm and full of tropical fish...and just a few sharks! Palau is actually a chain of small islands connected by causeways and bridges. There are not many sandy beaches, but there are literally hundreds of

limestone pinnacles around the shore lines forming many calm and private lagoons to enjoy a swim or to kayak around. The diving was exceptional. We saw manta rays galore, many sharks and some amazing caves and rock formations.

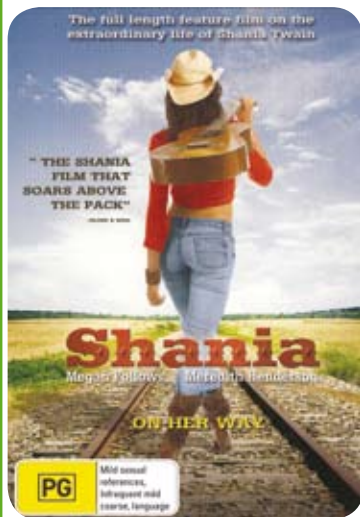
The highlight of the diving was at Blue Corner. This site is at the very edge of a reef that drops off many hundreds of metres to the ocean depths right in front of you. The cooler deep waters rise up here bringing food for millions of little fish. These bring in schools of mackerel and giant trevally which in turn bring in the large predators, the sharks – a whole food chain unfolding in front of us. By attaching ourselves to a rock with a hook in the strong currents we were able to watch a dozen sharks including white, silver and black tipped sharks, as well as grey reef sharks cruising round and round just a couple of metres from us. There were also manta rays, giant Napoleon wrasse and green turtles in the same location. My only frustration was that I had flooded my camera on my second dive in Palau, and couldn't take any underwater photos!!

I can definitely recommend Palau as a great diving location. The people are friendly and accommodating, ferrying us around the island without charging.

Tipping is considered embarrassing, but giving them chocolate makes friends for life! The hotel was clean, comfortable and air-conditioned, and the dive company professional and considerate. The town has some nice restaurants and there are a couple of places to party. We will be back!

and in the name of God, 120 men, women, and children were savagely murdered. *September Dawn* walks the viewer through the events leading up to this atrocity and challenges the possible reasons behind such blatant breaches of human rights, morals, and dignity.

What is also interesting is his character's interaction with his two sons - one of which is clearly more willing to blindly follow the doctrines of the Church than the other.

The storyline is quite complex, dealing with their leader's personal demons, historical hatred against the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, and the unbelievable faith some people can have in a Church and its leaders. Disturbing would be an understatement.

The massacre scene is quite graphic and should not be viewed by minors. This untold story of an American tragedy however is something to behold. The scenery is stunning, the acting flawless, the joining of the many different aspects seamless, and although not suitable for the whole family - something you really should see.

Entrants are also advised to include details of their professional web presence, study or work experience.
