



JAMIE CALLUM

Talent, a voice, and good looks - now that's my kind of artist <wink>

Jamie Cullum is about to tour Australia, and Universal Music has released his "twenty something" album just in time.

Amazing arrangements, some brilliant Piano and Bass work, and "Billy Joel - esque" vocals from Jamie, makes this album a must for Jazz lovers of all ages. 15 tracks (including a bonus) of classic to modern jazz numbers, twenty something attacks each piece with gusto and individuality.

It's full of cliques and groups - and the top one of the lot is the Plastics: three girls who are 'it', led by Queen Bee, Regina (McAdams).

When Cady's new friends, maybe-dyke Janis and gay boy Damien (Caplan and Franzese) encourage her to join and infiltrate, she finds herself torn between friendship, loyalty, and the need to be top bitch. Carlotta is probably the highest profile transgender person in Australia. She pioneered drag shows in the 60s in Sydney's Les Girls revue, she did a Miriam on saucy 70s TV show Number 96, and she's appeared on Beauty and the Beast - still in demand after 40 years. She spoke to ANDREW SHAW from her Sydney home as she prepares for her upcoming appearance at Melbourne's Fantasy Ball.

Carlotta, where are you working these days?

I'm doing all the clubs, darling, I'm booked out until July 2005.

Do you lead a glamorous life?

EVERYTHI

Of course it's got its glamorous side, but it's very hard work. I always say if you don't enjoy it, don't do it. It's been part of my life for 40 years so I can't knock it. I work hard at it.

I heard you're the Fantasy Ball's star attraction.

I'm going down for it, I don't know whether I'm the star attraction. It's the Grace Kelly Award. isn't it?

Did you watch There's Something About Miriam?

Yeah.

What did you think?

Well, they're not calling drag queens drag queens any more, they're calling them Miriams, so she's left some trademark behind. I think I'd rather be called a Miriam than a drag queen.

People don't still call you a drag gueen do they?

Some do. Straights do.

Is there still a fascination with transgender people?

Well, there must be darling, because I've been doing it for 40 years.

But you're in show business in your own right. In 70s TV soap Number 96 you were billed as a female actress and then the story line revealed you were actually a bloke.

I did a Miriam before Miriam.

Is Miriam perpetuating the idea that transgender people are out to deceive the general — straight — public?

To be fair, she was honest with them — if they asked, she'd tell them. She didn't try to be something that she's not. I admired her for that. She had my values — well I'm known anyway, people know my name like a friggin' postage stamp. No, I think they were using her.

Who?

The producers, for not revealing [her sex]. That's not her, she's proud of what she is. I mean, she doesn't want a sex change but there are a lot of queens around like that.

Did you see her on Big Brother?

Yeah, I thought she came over better on that than the other show. You see, she had to hide it in the other show.

Was Number 96 a big scandal at the time?

I wasn't known as much as I am now, but oh yeah [Reverend] Fred Nile went off his brain. But the publicity was good, it brought me out and Les Girls got even more people coming to see it!

In Number 96 they aired a scene where you were supposed to be shooting up hormones.

Well, that wasn't... We used to take tablets. They just made that up for more drama.

But how did you feel about it? Didn't you feel it was a bit-

No, I'm very proud of what I am. I've got a motto: if you don't like me you can blow it out your bum.

Are there still myths about transgenders, like they "shoot up" hormones?

No, I think it's very open today, people are very accepting. We're just normal people, only our lifestyles are different.

But it's not easy when you've got the Prime Minister refusing to acknowledge gay marriage and going out of his way to invalidate overseas unions here. He's the leader of the country and he's saying, 'You're not equal'.

But he's going to say that, darling, because he's got the churches on his back. And he's very strait-laced, Johnny Howard. I think Latham would be more understanding than Howard.

So it's just a matter of time?

It's just a matter of time. I always say don't push too hard because you'll get their backs up. There a few gay radicals out there who just make it harder for everyone else. They want things to happen overnight, but it's not going to happen overnight. [Activists] don't like drag queens either. How ludicrous is that? If it wasn't for drag queens we wouldn't have a gay scene.

You undertook one of Australia's first gender reassignment surgeries in the early 70s.

Yes, mine was publicly known, there were others. The press got hold of mine.

Were you scared?

No.

Why not?

I knew what I wanted and I did my homework. I knew I had the best doctor. I just didn't like being a boy, so I went and did it

But it must have been difficult because-

Well I think anyone going under surgery is a little bit scared, because you might not wake up (laughs). It all went well, I'm not complaining.

When I read your autobiography I thought you must be a very tough person. Are you?

Yep. People say I'm too soft, but I am tough underneath. I don't suffer fools very easily and I fight for what I believe in. I'll stick up for gays and drag gueens till the day I die. Because most of them are fantastic. It's the parents who have to be educated. I feel sorry for the ones where the parents can't accept it.

Beauty and the Beast was ground-breaking vou were there simply as a woman with an opinion.

I knew I was getting the word across. People know me as Carlotta and a lot of letters came in about transgenders and gays and that's when I got my view across, very strongly.

Do you think you've been lucky in life?

Oh, I suppose. But only because I've done it myself. I've worked hard, that's the secret. I didn't sit on my arse.

How has being in show business affected your personal life?

I'm not interested in relationships. I had one for 17 vears and I left him because I wanted him to have children. Now he's got three kids, so no. Look, that's the choice vou make. No one likes being second fiddle. I was in the lime-light, he wasn't. He was your average worker.

Do vou still see him?

Do I see him?

I mean socially.

I've seen him on occasion, we're still good friends. I didn't reveal who he was in my book because he's got children.

If you hadn't got into show business what would you be doina?

Oh, who knows, darling? How can you say that? I'm 60. You could say I would have been this and that, but this is what life dealt me and I dealt with it the best way I could and I'm happy.

What's the biggest change for transgenders that's happened since the sixties?

They can go down the street and get into a taxi without police persecuting them. They've got freedom.

What hasn't changed that you wish would?

Nothing. Everything's fabuous.

Eagle is on 28th so it is only a short stroll down the road, through the park and past the strip joint. This area has everything.



DJ Mr Hat's Laird Hotel Top 10



1> Sister Sledge - Lost In Music - DJ Tools Remix.

This is Amongst Bernard Edwards and Nile Rogers finest work. Every time I play this record (and there have been many) I can feel my bare feet sliding effortlessly into a pair of sparkling stilettos as my head and shoulders become wrapt in long flowing locks and I am instantly transported to another place and time. Enough said.

2> I'm Stranded - The Legendary Stardust Cowboy.

Unanimously voted the worst record ever made for quite a few years running. I played it again recently (at home, by myself, I generally don't let people hear this) and its genius is remarkable. It is yelling Hillbilly racket that has to be heard and felt to be believed. Just don't ask me to play it if you see me, you don't want to know.

3> The Anxious - "Mechanism" from: Beginning of the End.

This is another of my private indulgences, hard throbbing Techno. You know, I've always wondered what it would be like to gaffer tape my head to a pile driver at the peak of its run. This record goes most of the way to answering that question.

4> Money - The Flying Lizards.

This is David Cunningham's lo-fi outing into the fray with a classic Berry Gordy tune. It is defiantly more cult classic, than camp. This record always comes in handy when the atmosphere of the venue is starting to feel a little jaded. However the lead vocalists (credited as Sally Lizard) tuneless drawl may go over the head of many punters.

5> Groove Me - Fern Kinney.

I cannot count how many times I have been requested to play this tune. Maybe one day I'll play it while there are still some people left in the club.

6> Savage Lover - The Ring.

This has got to be my favourite disco record. The extended breakdown has a gorgeous simulated orgasm that always attracts attention; however the looks I get from people seem to suggest that I might be directly responsible. Sorry, it's just a record.

7> Jaydee - Plastic Dreams.

This record has recently been re-pressed by those lovely little people at Sony (there still must be a queen or two left there who still believe in vinyl, thank God) this tune (and I use the word loosely) is still guaranteed to shake up the house. The entire contents of which is purely a nice long throbbing organ solo. Who knew?

8> Amani vs Teapot - Two Days In The Desert

This record is notable mainly for the ridiculous name of the artist. Every time I am flicking through my records desperately scraping around for an idea to hold the night together, I am haunted by the name 'Amani vs Teapot'. The name just jumps right out at me. I probably play it more than I should.

9> Konigskinder - Suck it, Mama Dude (Marc O'Toole remix)

There is actually a narrative to this record. It tells the story of a hired Private Investigator who has to get snap-shots of an unfaithful wife caught in the act. One thing that is very enjoyably is the deft use of filthy language: Such poetry is so rare these days. I get frequent requests to play this record.

10> Different Gear - A Little Bit Paranoid

- Dub Mix.

I just had a look at this record and the side that I play has actually turned to a dull grey colour from being played so often. If anyone has been to The Laird over the last year or two on a Friday night, they would definitely have encountered this tune

"Filling the Cracks" - Products used to "fill" Wrinkles, Folds and Scars: Part One

Most people have heard of Collagen Injections for wrinkles, however the newer products have really taken over in the past four years or so. Worldwide there are some 60+ different types of skin filling agents, most of which will never pass the strict TGA regulations to be available in this country.

Basically various types of gels are injected with a fine needle under a wrinkle or indentation I.e. acne scar or under a skin fold to plump up and push up the skin so the surface contour becomes flatter. Local anaesthetic creams or injections are used prior to make the procedure more comfortable. There are semi-permanent (e.g. Restylane, Perlane, Newfill) and permanent fillers (e.g. Aquamid) available.


Restylane (\$200-450) is a non-animal clear gel made of Hyaluronic Acid which is

a molecule normally present in the skin of any animal. It is the commonest product I use in practice because it lasts much longer than the old collagen, does not need allergy testing and causes very few side effects. Restylane will last well over a year in fine lines and acne scars and around 10-12 months in lip borders. It is broken down by the body eventually and eliminated. Used for any fine to medium facial wrinkle, acne scars and lips.

Perlane (\$300-600) is just a thicker form of Restylane, used for deeper scars or folds like the nasolabial folds to the side of the nose. Perlane lasts up to 20% longer than Restylane and I use it to give a bigger look when doing lips (big kiss to my show girl friends). Used for the deep wrinkle between the eyes (Glabellar), any deeper scarring, lips and chin.

Newfill (\$400-800) is not a true filler in the sense of an instant result but is a molecule called Poly-Lactic-Acid which once injected into the dermis of the skin will stimulate your body to make its own collagen in the area (albeit immature collagen) which plumps up the area for 1-2 years. Comes as a powder and then mixed with water and local anaesthetic to produce a, well, liquid resembling an ejaculate! (too much information I know). I like Newfill for creating bigger cheek "bones" and filling the chin area under the lip corners (marionette lines). Newfill is used in AIDS patients to correct the lipodystrophy (loss of skin fat causing "hollow cheek" look). Your collagen takes 3-6 weeks to grow and then a second dose is placed, so the final result may be 3 months from the start. not a quick fix but a good stayer that looks natural.



In working as a fashion stylist it is my rule of thumb that style should be depicted by a person's



How many of us look at a window display and are inspired by the outfit, but only purchase a percentage of it?

A previous employer of mine has been, and continues to be, a prominently successful designer for many years. In his earlier days he made a full tulle skirt, full and long for a runway show relevant to the year.

As many one-off garments do, it ended up in the store and after a period of time, was hung from the roof as a display. Five years later, the then sun-bleached skirt was purchased. Many women walked by it, saw it, loved it, but it took five years for someone to take it home. Now I'm not saving that we should all go out and buy a new wardrobe of items we have never purchased before, and I'm not suggesting that what we are doing is wrong, but I am suggesting that it may be time for us to re-evaluate our lives and consider our goals and whether our look has been formed by us being only creatures of habit, and our cultural influences being the motivation.

David Menadue

Positive is the autobiography of Melbourne man David Menadue, one of the first gay men to be diagnosed as HIV positive back in the early 1980s, and who is, obviously, still alive. His book is a chronicle especially of those early AIDS years in the 1980s and 1990s, but it's a lot more personal than that too.

With his conversational tone and clean simple language. Menadue's book is an easy read in many ways, but also very touching, honest and moving read as well. Combined with the fact that it has increased relevance for us bovs in Melbourne, with familiar places, names and people, Positive is essential reading for not just gay men, but anyone who has lived with AIDS, or any long-term illness, and their families. lovers and carers.

Speaking to David recently, I asked him the obvious question of what prompted him to write the book, and he explained that it started life as a book based on his Positive Living columns over the last 20 years. "But my editor, John Ironmonger from Allen

& Unwin, said 'I don't think that's mainstream enough. It's too esoteric for our audience. and I think you need to write an autobiography. I think your life, being brought up in rural Victoria in the '50s and '60s is a story in itself that we haven't told enough in Australia, and certainly not about gay Australians, and I am really interested in your feelings in a country town, being different. and how you coped with the '70s in Melbourne and what gay Melbourne was like then. and also how you coped with the hysteria in the '80s.' It was a fairly convincing argument for me to give it a go."

Tragically, Ironmonaer himself died before David had finished the book, and he had to find another editor quicksmart. Enter Sophie Cunningham, also from Allen & Unwin. "She became a real friend; she was so nurturing. She gave me a gay editor, who was friend of mine, and the book designer was gay, and it was a very family thing, and a lovely experience."


Of course, writing a book about such a turbulent and emotional time - and it being autobiographical - wasn't exactly easy for David. "It was cathartic. I think I learned a few things about myself. When you're sitting down to write your autobiography, you think, what have been the most important things in my life? What have been the turning points, who are the most important people I've met, what's the most meaningful relationship I've had? And you cut out what vou think won't be interesting to other people."

In that way, David doesn't shy away from being honest. "It's something I pride myself on; I'm quite unabashed about the fact that some challenging things have happened to me in hospital, and I experienced negative thoughts about myself and I'm not ashamed of them. You've got to admit to a few vulnerabilities. I don't think it's a weakness to show my weak side."

Fitting then that Positive has only received positive responses. "I've had over book reviews in the mainstream press, as well as the gay and HIV press, and not one of those reviews has been negative. I couldn't have got a better publicity response.

"But the nicest thing that's happened to me since being an author is that people have come up to me and said how much they've enjoyed my book, and I don't know them from Adam. A number of them have said that it's because they've just been diagnosed as positive. So they've sought out my book because they wanted to know what the highs and lows are going to be like. One guy said, 'It made things all right. I needed to see what the worst possible thing that could happen to me was.' They took comfort from reading about that, also because I've survived."
